# Money and Wisconsin Elections in 2014

### April 18, 2016

All numbers are for *calendar* years and *fall general* elections unless indicated otherwise. Spending *excludes* committee to committee transfers. Numbers are rounded off. Candidate fundraising and spending totals are for *Democratic* and *Republican* candidates only. Financial activity by primary losers is excluded.

## Candidates

Republican: 6.4%.







Total income from all sources (contributions and non-contribution income sources) for all major party candidates in the fall general election: **\$53.7 million**.



2014 income from all sources for Democratic and Republican general election legislative candidates: \$9.2 million.










### **Governor Candidate Income**


2014 income from all sources for Democratic and Republican general election candidates for governor: **\$40.5 million** (75.5% of all general election candidate income in 2014).





2014 income from all sources for the Democratic general election candidate for governor: **\$15.1 million**.







General election Democratic candidate for governor: \$3.1 million (34.7%).


General election Republican candidate for governor: \$10.7 million. (51.9%)

Spending in 2014 by Democratic legislative candidates: **\$3.1 million**. Republicans: **\$5.7 million**.






In the form of undisclosed "issue ads:" **\$11.8 million**.


